# **Ohio Aerospace Day!**

On November 19th, the Ohio Aerospace and Aviation Council (OAAC) and the Ohio House of Representatives' Aerospace and Aviation Technology Committee (OAATC) co-sponsored the first full-day Ohio Aerospace Day in the Columbus state house. The objectives of

this Aerospace Day were closely aligned with those of the OAAC, an economic development organization, chartered by the Ohio governor, designed to attract and retain key growthoriented companies and to work collaboratively as leaders from all regions to strengthen and grow Ohio's aerospace and aviation industry. The day was an opportunity for movers and shakers from around the state to network, share new information, and generate new development initiatives that will drive Ohio's economy and increase the state's global competitiveness.

### A Farewell Thank You to Our Founder

He has known this time would come but he had no idea it would come so fast. One of our original founders, Walt Hoy, and long-serving Chairman of the Board of the Wright Image Group, has decided to step aside and slow down a bit. Walt has resigned from the Board of Directors.

Since the Group was first incorporated in 2005 until just a few years ago, Walt has been the face of the Triumph of Flight. In the early years he was constantly on what he called the "rubber chicken circuit," making the rounds of civic clubs, social clubs, engineering associations, and the complete spectrum of political councils in the Dayton region. The monument concept was much simpler then, and selling the idea was not difficult, but signing up donors and sponsors was every bit as difficult. Nonetheless, Walt succeeded in
